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Set 1: Musical instruments

String instruments

String instruments are those that produce sound by vibrating strings, which can be plucked, strummed, or bowed. They are often used in a wide range of musical styles, including classical, rock, and folk music.

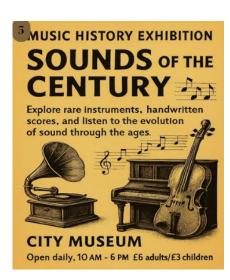

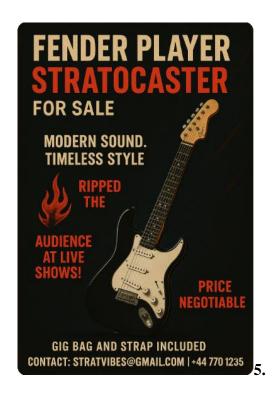

The history of Glastonbury Festival

The first festival at Worthy Farm was called the Pilton Pop, Folk and Blues Festival and took place in late Summer 1970, opening the day after Jimi Hendrix died. It was attended by 1,500 people. Admission was £1, which included free camping and free milk. Audiences enjoyed performances by Marc Bolan's Tyrannosaurus Rex who played in place of the Kinks who were due to headline.

Michael and Jean Eavis, festival co-founders, had been inspired by the Bath Festival of Blues and Progressive Music in Shepton Mallet, Somerset and by the success of the Isle of Wight Festival and Woodstock in the US the previous year, and decided to host a festival at the Eavis family dairy farm.

By 1971 the festival had been renamed The Glastonbury Fayre and the date was changed to coincide with summer solstice, an anniversary celebrated at nearby Stonehenge, home to the world-famous Neolithic monument. Key organisers now included Andrew Kerr and Arabella Churchill. The team drew up a manifesto which set out the environmental and spiritual focuses at the heart of the Festival's ethos.

The Festival founders saw the event as a place for the "expression of free-thinking people". In the same year, the first Pyramid Stage, a replica of the Great Pyramid of Giza in Egypt, was designed and built by Bill Harkin and crew out of scaffolding, expanded metal and plastic sheeting.

Broadcasts and popularity

The Festival took another leap in its development in the early 1990s as it attracted the new wave of Britpop bands and became an important destination for the emerging dance and rave culture. In 1994 Oasis, Pulp, Blur and Radiohead all made their festival debuts as Glastonbury embraced the rising stars of the burgeoning British music industry. In the same year a new Pyramid Stage was hastily erected after the original stage was lost in an accidental fire just days before the Festival was due to start. This seminal festival year also saw Glastonbury's first television broadcast by Channel 4 – a significant moment in establishing the Festival's ongoing success and popularity (continued by the BBC from 1997). In 1998, TV audiences could join festival-goers in watching Tony Bennett take the stage on the new Sunday afternoon 'legends slot', reserved for established, well-loved artists, often from a different musical world to the more traditional Glastonbury fare.

Popular music styles

Task 5:

23. A- Understanding of musical theory

The correct answer is *understanding* because composers need to have a deep comprehension of music theory, structure, and emotion in order to craft original and meaningful compositions. The word "understanding" fits as it conveys the necessity of intellectual engagement with music theory.

- Definition is too narrow and doesn't capture the depth of knowledge required.
- Suggestion would imply a less certain approach, which isn't suitable here.
- *Instruction* suggests a more formal or educational aspect, which is not what the passage focuses on.

24. **B** – *Breaking* the rules of music

The correct answer is *break* because composers are described as knowing when to *break* the rules to create something original. This matches the context of the passage, where it talks about the need to break free from conventions.

- *Explain* implies giving a detailed account, which isn't relevant to the context of breaking rules to create something new.
- Avoid suggests steering clear of something, which contradicts the idea of intentionally breaking rules.
- *Test* doesn't fit the idea of creation or breaking rules, as it implies a trial or experiment rather than an active decision in music composition.

25. C-Patience in the composition process

The correct answer is *patience* because the passage emphasizes that composers often spend hours revising their work, suggesting that patience is crucial for perfecting their compositions.

- *Talent* implies an innate ability, but the passage stresses the process of revision and improvement, which is more about persistence and patience than innate skill.
- *Pressure* would suggest that composers are under stress, which isn't mentioned as a key factor in their process.
- *Training* refers to formal instruction, but the passage talks more about discipline and revising, not just formal learning.

26. C – Collaboration with other musicians

The correct answer is *collaborate* because the passage mentions composers working together with performers, conductors, or filmmakers, which suggests cooperation and teamwork.

- *Compete* suggests rivalry, which doesn't align with the passage's message about composers working together.
- *Create* is too general and doesn't emphasize the partnership aspect.
- Compare doesn't fit because the passage is about working together, not comparing ideas.

27. **B**– *Compose* music that moves people

The correct answer is *compose* because the passage talks about composers' goal of creating music that emotionally connects with people. *Compose* directly refers to the act of creating music, which is the main focus.

- *Describe* refers to explaining something in words, which doesn't fit the context of creating music.
- *Deliver* implies presenting or distributing, not the creative process itself.
- *Perform* involves playing or singing music, not composing it, which is the task described in the passage.

Task 6.

28. -B – had performed

The correct answer is *had performed* because it refers to an action that happened before another event in the past — in this case, *before she became famous*. This is the **Past Perfect Tense**, used to describe an action completed before another past action.

The correct answer is *used to* because it refers to a past habit or repeated action that no longer happens — in this case, writing songs as a teenager.

- A-nowhere is incorrect because it contradicts the idea of music being omnipresent. "Nowhere" means "not present," which would not fit the context.
- C-somewhere suggests a limited or specific location, which doesn't fit the idea of music being present everywhere.
- D- anywhere is somewhat close but does not convey the idea of being found universally. Everywhere is more definitive, implying that music is in all places.

24. - B - quiet

The correct answer is *quiet* because the sentence describes a street that is calm and tranquil. The word *quiet* works well here to describe a peaceful atmosphere, which contrasts with the typical bustling energy of a street.

- A busy is incorrect because it would imply a lot of activity, which doesn't fit with the context where the street is described as having a softer, more peaceful sound.
- C-abandoned doesn't fit because an abandoned street would imply emptiness or desolation, not something lively enough to have music in it.
- D-occupied could be a suitable word, but it doesn't specifically imply the calmness of a street. *Quiet* more directly conveys the peaceful soundscape.

25. - D - celebrations

The correct answer is *celebrations* because the sentence "From joyful celebrations to quiet moments of reflection" refers to events or occasions of joy, marking the presence of music during happy and festive times. *Celebrations* best matches the context of music being part of these lively, joyful occasions.

- A-ceremonies is incorrect because while ceremonies may involve music, it doesn't specifically capture the celebratory or joyful nature that *celebrations* does.
- B-vacations is not correct because vacations are not necessarily associated with music in the same way that celebrations are, and it doesn't fit the tone of joy and festivity.
- C funerals is incorrect because it has a somber connotation, which contrasts with the idea of joyous moments described in the sentence.

26. - B - speaks

The correct answer is *speaks* because "Music speaks all languages" uses *speaks* in the Present Simple tense, which is used to express general truths or facts. In this case, the phrase implies that music communicates universally, transcending language barriers.

- A tells is incorrect because "tells" would suggest a more direct narrative or explanation, which doesn't fit with the abstract nature of music communicating across languages.
- C-talks is incorrect because "talks" would imply a conversation, which is not the intended meaning. Music conveys emotions and ideas, but it doesn't engage in a literal conversation.
- D-says is not the best choice here because "Says" is used with reported speech (e.g., He says it's cold today), but it needs a specific message, not a language.

27. - C - lingers

The correct answer is *lingers* because "a melody lingers in the mind" suggests that the melody stays with you, persistently occupying your thoughts. *Lingers* emphasizes the lasting impact of music, staying in your mind after hearing it.

- A-recalls is incorrect because "recalls" implies an active process of remembering something, while *lingers* better conveys the passive and continuous nature of the melody's effect.
- B-reminds is incorrect because "reminds" would suggest that the melody triggers a specific memory, which doesn't fully capture the idea of it staying with you.
- D-keeps doesn't work well in this context because it doesn't convey the same sense of lasting impact that *lingers* does. "Keeps" implies holding something, but *lingers* conveys a sense of something that remains or persists.

Task 6:

28. **B** – learned

"I learned to play the piano when I was six."

→ **Past Simple Tense** is used here because "learned" refers to a completed action that took place at a specific moment in the past ("when I was six").

Past Simple is used to describe actions that are finished or events that happened at a particular point in time.

29. A - to read

"My teacher showed me how to read music."

 \rightarrow **Infinitive** (to + verb) after "how."

After the structure "how + infinitive," we use the verb in its infinitive form with "to." After "how" (unless it's part of a question), the verb should be in **infinitive** form.

30. D - slowly

"I got better slowly."

→ **Adverb** modifies the verb "got better," describing the manner in which the improvement happened.

Adverbs describe **how**, **when**, or **where** actions take place. In this case, it describes the speed or pace of improvement.

31. A - a few

"After a few months, I could play songs by ear."

→ "A few" + countable plural noun.

"Months" is a countable noun in the plural form, so we use "a few," which means "a small number of."

"A few" is used with **countable nouns**, whereas "a little" is used with **uncountable nouns**.

32. C-love

"That's when I knew I'd always love music."

→ Base form of the verb after "would" — in this case, "love" is in its base form because after modal verbs like "would," we always use the base form of the verb (without "to").

After **modal verbs** (like will, would, can, could, should, etc.), always use the **base form** of the verb (e.g., "love," "go," "play").

The poster advertises a Fender Player Stratocaster guitar for sale, highlights features like "modern sound" and "timeless style," and says "price negotiable." This clearly targets people looking to buy a guitar, especially at a potentially reduced price, making it a bargain.

Task 2:

6. The headline shows that:

A: children achieve the benefits in other spheres of their lives learning music.

The text highlights the non-musical benefits of music, suggesting that music education impacts children's development in various areas like cognitive, emotional, creativity, and collaboration skills.

7. The research has shown that music education can help improve:

C: cognitive, emotional skills and creativity.

The text specifically mentions that music education improves cognitive skills (memory, attention, problem-solving), emotional skills (empathy, self-expression), and fosters creativity.

8. Why are schools cutting music programs?

D: due to the lack of money.

The text states that many schools are cutting music programs "due to budget constraints," indicating the lack of funding as the reason for these cuts.

9. The author believes that:

C: every child may express themselves through music.

The author states that they believe every child deserves to express themselves through music, showing a strong belief in the value of music education for all children.

10. Who is the author of the text?

A: The teacher of Show Me Mozart School.

The author of the text is involved in music education at Show Me Mozart, which is directly stated in the text. The reference to the school and its educational program suggests the author's role there.

Task 3:

11. Glastonbury (UK) – G: The festival which was originally set up on a private agricultural property.

Glastonbury was founded by Michael Eavis on his dairy farm, which makes it fit into this category.

12. *Coachella (USA) – B: A long-running event that hosts a mix of music and arts.*Coachella is known not only for its music but also for its significant focus on art, with large-scale installations and sculptures.

13. Tomorrowland (Belgium) – C: A gathering focused on electronic music and immersive visuals.

Tomorrowland is an iconic electronic dance music (EDM) festival, known for its elaborate stage designs and high production values.

14. Rock in Rio (Brazil) – E: An event originally designed to boost local culture and attract visitors.

Rock in Rio was created to promote culture, music, and tourism in Brazil, aligning with this category.

15. Fuji Rock (Japan) – D: A festival set in a picture que outdoor location with an ecofriendly ethos.

Fuji Rock is known for its scenic mountainous backdrop and commitment to environmental sustainability.

16. Sziget (Hungary) – H: A major European festival that began as a modest youth-led cultural initiative

The text says it was founded by Hungarian artists and music lovers as a low-budget student event, which suggests a youth-led and modest beginning, later growing into a major European festival.

Task 4:

17. A. moved to Los Angeles and met young musician

The sentence refers to the beginning of Cher's career, specifically when she **met Sonny Bono**. Option A directly states this with the phrase "met young musician", matching the context.

18. E. entered the Top 20 on the Billboard 200 chart

The sentence mentions Cher's **first solo album**, and we expect a result or success. Option E fits logically as it describes the **album's chart success**, which is common in describing musical careers.

19. D. continued to grow both as a solo artist

The sentence talks about her music career and her work with Sonny. Option D fits grammatically and contextually, showing how her career progressed **in both directions**—solo and duo.

20. H. released 27 studio albums

The phrase emphasizes her prolific career, releasing numerous studio albums.

21. B. acted and sang in popular movies

The sentence mentions **Burlesque** and **Mamma Mia!**, both of which are musical films where Cher acted and sang. Option B clearly summarizes her **dual role** in these movies.

22. C. won a lot of major awards

The sentence lists many **awards** (Grammys, Golden Globes, etc.), so the logical conclusion is that she **won** them, which matches Option C perfectly.

Task 5

23. B – dates

The correct answer is *dates* because the phrase "playing dates in Denmark, West Germany and Austria" refers to scheduled performances or concerts. In the music industry, a *date* often means a specific time and place for a performance.

- A-notes refers to musical notation, which doesn't make sense in this context.
- C-beats are rhythmic units of music, not relevant to the idea of scheduled concerts.
- D-lyrics are the words of songs and unrelated to touring or performance scheduling.

24. *C* – *venues*

The correct answer is *venues* because the sentence says "most of the venues did not sell out." *Venue* refers to the place where an event (like a concert) is held.

- A-headphones are personal audio devices, irrelevant here.
- B-bands are musical groups, not the locations of the events.
- D-playlists are song collections, not physical locations for concerts.

25. *C* – *performances*

The correct answer is *performances* because it refers to live events where music is played for an audience. The sentence talks about ABBA continuing to perform live, so *performances* fits naturally.

- A rehearsals are private practice sessions, not public concerts.
- B-tracks are individual recordings, not live events.
- D-covers are versions of songs by other artists, not related to touring activities.

26. **D** – audience

The correct answer is *audience* because "an estimated audience of 19,200" describes the number of people who attended the concert. *Audience* is the group of people watching a live performance.

- A rhythm refers to musical timing, not people.
- B-playlist is a selection of songs, not a crowd.
- C setlist is a list of songs to be performed, not the listeners.

27. B – singles

The correct answer is *singles* because ABBA released individual songs after their big hit "Waterloo." A *single* is a song released separately to promote an artist or upcoming album.

- A albums are full-length collections of songs, and while relevant, the context here is about immediate releases following a hit.
- C-songs is too general and doesn't fit the specific idea of marketing or strategic releases.
- D-tracks is a broader term and not as precise as *singles* in this context.

Task 6:

28. **B** - perform

The verb "perform" should be in the base form after the phrase "I went to see," indicating the planned action at the time. The phrase is in the past tense, so the base form is used to express the event the speaker was going to see.

29. D - had already started

This is the correct past perfect tense, which is used to show that the action (starting to play by air) was completed before the speaker arrived. The past perfect is appropriate here as it describes an action that had already begun in the past before another past event.

30. A - for

"For" is used to indicate a period of time, and here it correctly refers to the length of time (weeks) the band had been rehearsing. "Since" would refer to a specific point in time, which doesn't fit the context.

31. *A* - *better*

"Better" is the correct comparative form of "good," and it is used to compare the band's performance with the speaker's expectations. "more worse" and "more better" are grammatically incorrect.

32. **B** - despite

"Despite" is the correct word here because it introduces a contrast between the small venue and the band's success in playing to full houses. "However" does not work in this context as it is more appropriate for joining two contrasting statements.

This company sells musical instruments and accessories for both beginners and professionals.

The ad invites anyone to join a choir with no auditions or experience needed, perfect for those starting a new musical hobby.

The text states that admission was £1, which included free camping and free milk. This is explicitly mentioned in the first paragraph.

Michael and Jean Eavis were inspired by the Bath Festival, the Isle of Wight Festival, and Woodstock. These were all well-known music events at the time.

8. What was the main focus of the festival according to the manifesto in 1971?

B — Environmental and spiritual values

The manifesto created in 1971 emphasized environmental and spiritual focuses, clearly stated in the paragraph about the Glastonbury Fayre.

9. What happened to the original stage in 1994?

B — It burnt out

The original Pyramid Stage was destroyed in an accidental fire just days before the festival began in 1994.

10. When was the festival first broadcast on television?

B — In 1994

The text mentions that Channel 4 broadcast the festival for the first time in 1994, marking a significant development in its popularity.

Task 3:

11. Blues — E came from work songs and folk songs

The text says blues "developed out of folk music, spiritual songs and work songs". This directly matches option E.

12. Jazz — A requires musicians to improvise a lot

Jazz is described as featuring "lots of improvisation" and requiring musicians to react "spontaneously". This is a clear match to A.

13. Gospel — C was sung in religious settings

Gospel music is based on "hymns, spirituals and sacred songs" and includes lyrics "in praise or giving thanks to God". This shows a religious context — option C.

14. Rock — B has the powerful sound of guitars

Rock is described as using electric guitar, bass guitar and drums, with songs that have "powerful lyrics" and a "heavy beat". Option B fits best.

15. Reggae — F was influenced by traditional Jamaican music and American rhythm 'n' blues

The text states reggae has roots in "traditional Jamaican music" and "American rhythm 'n' blues", making option F the correct match.

16. Rap — G started in New York and originated from a Jamaican technique

Rap "originated in the Bronx in New York" and "its vocal roots lie in a Jamaican technique called 'toasting'". This clearly matches option G.

Task 4:

17. C — owns every single one of their albums

This sentence describes the depth of his passion. The phrase "his love for it is so strong that..." introduces a result or consequence. Owning every album is a clear and concrete demonstration of strong love for a band.

18. A — and he talks about their music all the time

This sentence extends the idea. It would be logical for someone who thinks no band compares to his favourite to talk about them constantly. The two actions are naturally connected.

19. H — is even more passionate about bands

Grammatically, "he is even more passionate about bands that play their songs" fits perfectly. This likely refers to tribute bands. The phrase builds on the earlier idea of his deep admiration and shows an even greater level of involvement.

20. D — that the band's touring manager personally contacted him one day

This result clause ("so many... that") makes logical sense only with this option. His extreme dedication caught the attention of the band's manager, leading to a reward — free tickets.

21. E — how much it meant to my dad

The phrase "I knew how much it meant to my dad" clearly explains the speaker's reason for agreeing, despite not being a fan of the band. It's emotional motivation and fits the tone perfectly.

22. F — that were part of the performance

This ending clause describes the role of the light effects. "That were part of the performance" logically and grammatically completes the sentence, describing what made the concert impressive.

Task 5:

23. C – hit the big time

The phrase "hit the big time" means to become successful or famous. In this context, the speaker is talking about seeing their favorite band live, implying the band has become very popular. This idiom fits naturally when describing success in the entertainment industry.

- hit the jackpot usually refers to winning a lot of money.
- break out means to escape or sometimes to become known suddenly, but it doesn't fit grammatically here.
 - hit the mark means to be accurate or successful, but it's less common in this context.

24. **A** – *event*

The speaker says they had been waiting for something "for months," and that something is the concert itself. "Event" is the most suitable noun here to refer generally to something scheduled like a concert.

- celebration suggests a party, not a concert.
- adventure refers to an exciting experience, but not a scheduled public performance.
 - trip refers to travel, not the concert itself.

25. A - sing along to

This phrase is used when someone sings together with music, a song, or a melody. It emphasizes the sound or rhythm you're following.. This collocation is idiomatic and natural in English.

- sing up not a correct phrase.
- sing out loud means to sing loudly but doesn't fit with "the rhythm."
- sing along with This phrase is used when someone sings together with a person or group. It emphasizes the people you're singing with.

26. **D** – *buzzing*

The phrase "buzzing with excitement" is a common idiom to describe a place full of energy and liveliness. It shows the crowd's emotional state during the concert.

- uploading completely unrelated.
- filling doesn't describe emotion or atmosphere.
- appealing means attractive but doesn't work with "with excitement."

27. \mathbf{B} – go on a tour

Bands typically "go on a tour", meaning they travel and perform at different places. The band promises to do this again next year, which is the most logical continuation.

- go on a strike means to protest by stopping work.
- break out not suitable here.
- go on leave typically refers to taking time off from work, not performing again.

Task 6:

28. **C** – *moved*

"When the musician moved to London..."

This is a completed action in the past, so we need the past simple tense. "Moved" is the correct past form of "move".

- move present tense, doesn't fit the past time frame.
- to move infinitive, grammatically incorrect here.
- moves present tense, also incorrect.

29. **B** – was given

"He was given a small bedroom in the attic..."

This is passive voice in the past simple. Paul didn't give the room—he received it. "Was given" correctly shows he received the room.

- is given present tense.
- gave active voice (Paul would be the subject giving, which is not the case).
- gives present tense.

30. **B** – *helpful*

"This skill was helpful later when fans found out..."

We need an adjective to describe the noun "skill". "Helpful" is correct because it describes how useful the skill was.

- help verb or noun, not an adjective.
- to help infinitive, not correct in this structure.
- helper noun, refers to a person, not appropriate here.

31. $\mathbf{A} - climb$

"Paul McCartney had to climb out of the window..."

After "had to", we use the base form of the verb. "Climb" is the correct base form.

- to climb infinitive form, not used after "had to".
- climbing gerund, incorrect here.
- climbed past tense, but after "had to" we don't use past form.

32. \mathbf{D} – to escape

"He used their kitchen and a garage to escape unnoticed..."

"Used... to" is followed by the base form to show purpose. "To escape" is correct because it explains why he used the kitchen and garage.

- escape not grammatical without "to" in this context.
- escaping gerund, doesn't show purpose properly.
- escaped past tense, doesn't follow "used" properly.
